AWARDS

Best Livestock Exhibits

Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy, Market Feeder Calves, Dairy Goat: **An award will be presented to the exhibitor whom the JUDGES deem has the best exhibit in each of the above divisions.** The awards will be based upon the quality of the animal(s) shown and neatness and cleanliness of the exhibit. If, in the opinion of the judge, there is no exhibit representative of the above qualifications, there will be no award given.

In the Rabbit Division a Best of Show and Reserve Best of Show will be awarded.

In the Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Swine and Dairy Goat divisions Grand and Reserve Champions will be selected. In Breeding Beef, a Champion female and Champion bull will be selected.

Indoor Awards

In the Home Economics and General Projects, exhibitors will receive ribbons. In addition, gold seals will be given to outstanding blue ribbon exhibits and special awards will be presented to the best exhibits in each project area. First year clothing exhibitors may compete for the Mary O. Bezera award.

PROCEDURES

Judging System

Exhibits are judged by the Danish System. Entries are placed 1st (blue), 2nd (red), 3rd (white), according to their inherent quality. An exhibit is awarded its placement regardless of the number of exhibits placing above or below.

Liability for Loss

The Kings District Fair and the Kings County 4-H Club Council do not assume responsibility for protecting exhibits or visitors from loss or injury.

Showing Old Projects

An exhibit may be shown only once in the 4-H Fair, except livestock dept.

Exhibit Removal

Animals shown on Friday may be released that evening at 10:00 p.m., except for Round Robin winners. Livestock and Home Economics will be released after Round Robin and Awards have been completed. Stalls must be cleaned before animals and exhibitors leave.

Expenses

To save on our expenses, please use only the lights and heat when necessary.

Bedding for Animals

No bedding will be provided. Exhibitors will need to provide bedding of their own choice and clean stalls and pens before taking animals home on Friday or Saturday.

****If a barn area is roped off, please do not use that area unless you have approval from the project chairs of that species.**

Don't forget your shovels, rakes and wheelbarrows.

Exhibits from School

Items made in school as part of a school project may not be exhibited in the 4-H Fair.

Entry Card

Dairy Cattle, Goat, Livestock, Dog, and Rabbit entries are due by noon on April 17, 2009. They should be turned in to the Cooperative Extension office. **Entries for all other divisions are to be filled out at the fairgrounds as you enter your projects.**

DAIRY AND LIVESTOCK DIVISIONS

Ownership or use of the 4-H uniform is not a requirement for participation in 4-H.

Out of respect for those events that are still in progress, exhibitors are expected to leave their animals on the fairgrounds until after the awards presentation.

SHOWMANSHIP

A. A member must exhibit and own their animal in order to be eligible for showmanship. Members must show in the showmanship class for his/her age group. Showmanship winners should be prepared to bring their own animals to Round Robin.

B. Ages for showmanship classes are:

Junior - 9-10 yrs. (As of January 1, 2009)

Intermediate - 11-13 yrs. (As of January 1, 2009)*

Senior - 14-19 yrs. (As of January 1, 2009)

*** Any Intermediate member may enter the Senior instead of Intermediate class.**

NOTICE TO MEMBERS AND PARENTS

Round Robin Animal Showmanship

When a member wins first place in showmanship at the 4-H Fair, he or she is eligible to enter the Round Robin Showmanship Contest. The 2nd and 3rd place participants in showmanship should be ready to participate in Round Robin should the first place winner elect not to enter or be deemed ineligible.

In Round Robin, the members will be asked to show the following animals:

Beef Cattle	Sheep
Dairy Cattle	Swine
Market Feeder Calves	Dairy Goats

In order to be as sure as we can that this will be a safe and educational experience for the members, the following policies will be followed:

1. The chairperson for each specie may substitute animals for Round Robin if they deem it necessary. The safety of members and spectators is to be the primary consideration for the selection of animals. The chairperson will also designate adults (not related to members participating in Round Robin) to supervise the animals between rounds and be ready to give assistance if animals become uncontrollable during the show.
2. Opportunities to be instructed in and practice showing all species of animals will be made available to the winners of the showmanship classes throughout the day.
3. It is the responsibility of the member to seek out instruction in the showing of any animals with which he or she is not familiar. This should be done by contacting the person in charge of the specie, who will direct the member to the proper person to provide the training.
4. One hour prior to Round Robin, participants must turn in a permission form signed by a parent indicating that the member is believed to be sufficiently prepared for Round Robin.
5. No member should or will be forced to participate in Round Robin if he or she does not feel ready. The member will be allowed to participate in Round Robin and yet opt out of showing a particular specie. The member should understand that no points will be earned for that round of judging.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Range Conditions and Equipment Concerns:

LSC is a clean covered range that faces North with dirt berms on the North, East and West sides. The firing points are on a concrete slab. Wind is a factor on the range. Card board or foam type target frames will be used. We will use staplers and hang two targets at a time. Shooters or their assistant can hang their own targets but will not be able to handle their own targets once they have been fired on. Shooters will remove the target to the right of their own after the firing period has ended and the range is cleared for down range traffic. Bagged shooters can bring any rest type device that they choose as long as it does not lock the rifle to the rest. Only .22-Caliber rifles will be allowed. Only 1-Round may be loaded into the rifle at anytime. Both the Prone and Prone Rested Tournaments are Iron Sight tournaments only. Prone shooters will only compete against Prone shooters and Rested shooters will only compete against other Rested shooters. Both venues will be separated by the 4-H classifications. Firing positions will be assigned based on operational need.

Shooters should dress for the weather conditions and bring things to drink and eat. Bringing portable shade for down time is encouraged. Hopefully we will be able to give Shooters their Firing Point and Relay assignments by 8:35am and they will be able to set up their Firing Position at that time. Shooters will have approximately 15-minutes to hang their targets down range.

SAN JOAQUIN VALLEY & KINGS COUNTY 4-H FAIR SMALLBORE RIFLE TOURNAMENTS

GENERAL INFORMATION

Range Conditions and Equipment Concerns: (Continued)

Shooters will be called to the Firing Line at 8:52am and their 3-minute preparation period will begin at 8:57am. Shooting begins at 9:00am and the awards are projected to be issued at around 2:30pm for one relay and at around 4:30pm for two relays.

Awards:

Medals or trophies will be given as individual awards and the top team will be placed on the multi-year plaque. Awards will be given to the top shooter in each classification for each tournament. Three over-all awards will be given for each tournament; those shooters will be pulled out of the award schedule for the various classifications. No shooter will receive more than one award per tournament.

The awards for the SJV Tournament will be given out immediately following the scoring of the targets on the day of tournament. The scores for the KC Tournament will be extracted from the SJV Tournament scores and the awards will be handed out at the Kings County 4-H Fair on **Sunday, May 3, 2009.**

Protest/Challenges:

Shooters should advise the Range Officer as soon if they believe that their target has been fired upon by another competitor and the competitor that caused the cross fire should also alert the Range Officer as soon as they realize their error. Those corrections will be made during the initial scoring of targets. The Range Officer will communicate to the Statistical Director the need to make these corrections. All other corrections will be considered and reviewed during a Protest/Challenge Period after the last set of targets has been scored for any given match and released to the shooters. The Protest/Challenge Period will begin as soon as the targets are released to the shooters following their just completed match. Protests/Challenges need to be referred to the Statistical Director on the Protest/Challenge Form which will be on site where the targets are posted. A final 10-minute Protest/Challenge Period will occur after the last targets are posted for the shooters review. It is our intent to ensure that everyone receives their proper score. Work with us on this matter.

Note: The match operators reserve the option of changing the match format to adapt to unforeseen operational needs. **Arend LaBlue** is the Tournament Director, **Tim Stone** will be the Range Officer and **Paul Hollar** will be the Statistical Officer. Any Challenge Juries will be comprised of 3-Random Shooters, one from each age classification with the Statistical Officer providing the NRA Rule Book.

Coaching: Coaching on the firing line is disallowed. Coaching behind the firing line is allowed. The shooter may leave his/her firing point to be coached behind the firing line. New shooters are encouraged to ask questions of match officials at anytime to assist them through the match process. The Range Officer may allow coaches/parents to assist in equipment or safety problems during the match if the shooter appears to need the help.

Age groups: Juniors: 9-10 years old, Intermediate: 11-13 years old, Senior: 14-18 years old. These ages are as of January 1, 2008.

Award Categories: Ribbons for first through sixth in each age group for both categories; medals for first place in each age group for both categories; trophy for overall high point winner in each category; and plaque for overall high point winner of the archery competition. Awards will be given the day of the match.

Rules: Same rules apply as those used at the archery meetings. Added rules include: There will be 10 rounds with 3 arrows shot per round. If more than 3 arrows are shot, highest score(s) will be taken out (example: If 5 arrows are shot, two highest scores will be taken out). Rounds are 3 minutes maximum. No talking to anyone on the shooting line during competition, two warnings will be given before subject is removed from the competition. Coaching is only allowed during practice shoot, not during competition. Safety complaints and/or concerns will be addressed by joint officials. In the event of a dispute between a competitor and scorer, the competitor is allowed to call over an official to settle the dispute. The officials have the final word in the event of a dispute. Holes made by the arrows are to be marked before arrows are removed. All competitors will be shooting at the same distance of approximately 15 yards. Adults will shoot at 20 yards ("Fun Shoot"). Competition will ensue regardless of weather conditions.

The target to be used will be the 40cm colored target. These targets are scored 1-10 plus the X ring. Any shot outside of the ring will be a zero. The match will consist of 10 ROUNDS- 3 shots per round totaling 30 shots. There will be a 3 minute time frame per round. Arrow must break target. If an arrow breaks the line, shooter receives the next highest score. **If shooter shoots more than 3 arrows, that round will not be scored.** If there is a cross fire, shooter will lose the score for that arrow. Any arrow dropped within one (1) yard may not be picked up until the **Range Master** stops the line and clock. After line is safe, shooter may shoot the arrow. If arrow is dropped farther than one (1) yard from the shooting line, shooter may not retrieve this arrow to shoot. Shooter loses that shot (no score). Shooting line will be straddled at each distance. The safety line will

only be crossed by the shooters who are called forward to shoot. Bows will be placed on the bow rack behind line with arrows in a quiver or suitable storage.

There will be no talking between safety and shooting lines. Shooters may address questions to the RANGE MASTER as needed.

Whistle Commands: (2) **Two Blasts:** Archers to the shooting line, (1) **One Blast:** Begin Shooting,

Duck Call: Stop Shooting **IMMEDIATELY!!** Put arrows in quiver

After The Whistle Commands: There is no coaching or talking on the shooting line. All problems will be addressed to the Range Master. Two warnings for Misconduct, such as talking on the line, stepping over lines, or not following commands, any other safety violations such as pointing a knocked arrow toward another shooter would be an example of misconduct. Practice rounds will be allowed at specified times for each match to be held. In the 4-H State Invitational Archery Match, there will be 2-6 judges that will pull the arrows and write down scores on the score sheets.

Compound:

Class A: fingers only, without sights, no counterbalance

Class B: release without sights, no counterbalance

Class C: finger with sights, with or without counterbalance
